The coursework folder is made up of 1 full project and a selection of other work.

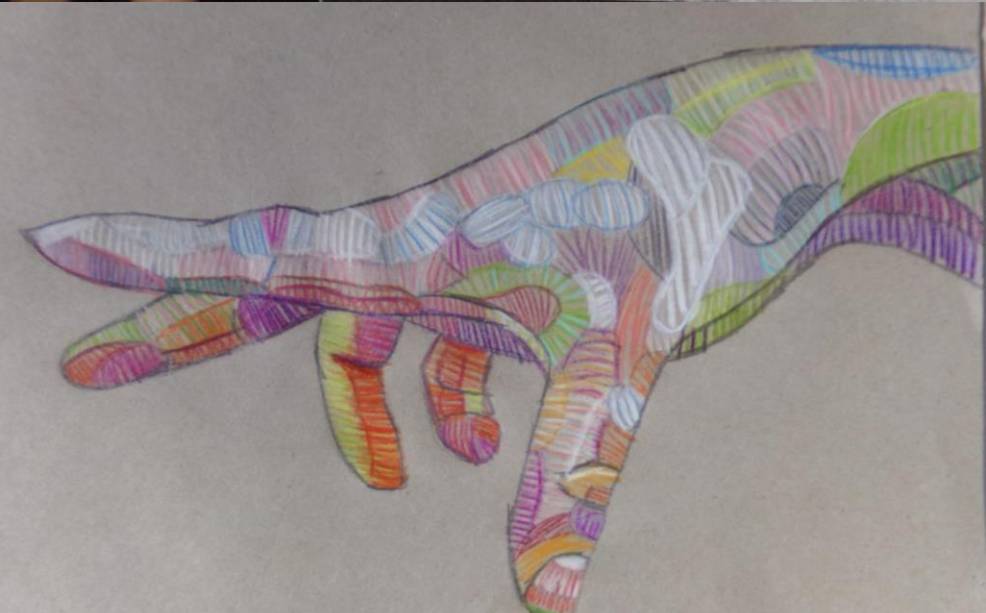
- The full project needs to show

- 2) Development of ideas
- 3) Initial ideas and research and
- 4) Final piece.

GCSE ART AND DESIGN

- 40% exam.
- There is no written exam.
- The exam is a project that you prepare for in class.
- You have 10 hours (spread over several days, during normal school) in exam conditions to finish your final piece.
- The exam paper is given in January of year 11 and gives 7 different topics to choose from
- You work on the exam project in class for the Spring term (approx 12 wks).
- The exam takes place in April of year 11, normally after the Easter break.
